Data Base – Barb: as of today we have 89 members

Charitable Giving Workgroup - Kathy: new committee being headed by Julie to redo Club giving guidelines and to make suggestions for projects that HGC might support. In response to member comments, Louise explained that the project suggestions that came out of the group's first meeting are educational efforts that fit the guidelines in the current HGC bylaws. Giving to organizations or projects that are not educational (like city beautifying projects) would require a change in the bylaws. The Committee will update the current donation policy for the Board's consideration. Meetings are via Zoom, contact Julie for participation.
