# **Invasive Plants—Bonus Speaker**

Jen Chauvet, Homer Soil & Water Conservation Service

After having to cancel her presentation for the April HGC meeting, this month Jen Chauvet with Homer Soil and Water Conservation Service will give a short presentation on invasive plants as described below.

Invasive plants threaten our native ecosystems and wildlife, and can invade your garden. Ironically, some of Alaska's most troublesome invasive plants were originally introduced as ornamentals. Some even remain available for purchase at local plant retailers and online. The Kenai Peninsula Cooperative Invasive Species Management Area (KP-CISMA) wants to keep these plants off our shelves, out of our gardens, and out of our wild spaces. And we need your help! As a gardener, how can we support you in your efforts to maintain a yard free from invasive plants? As a plant retailer, what kinds of resources might help you make informed decisions about avoiding invasive plants in your business?

We'd love to hear your ideas, needs, and wish list items. Your feedback will be valuable in informing our community outreach and support efforts.

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# **Charitable Giving Guidelines**

## Charitable Giving Guidelines

We are finally done! We know that you all are probably wondering why this has taken so long but there were just a lot of details that we didn't want to get wrong. Following is the final version for your review. We will be voting on it at the next General Meeting on May 14<sup>st</sup> to make sure that it meets your approval. As you will note, these guidelines refer to a "General Giving Committee", which upon approval of this document will become a Standing Committee of the Homer Garden Club. It will be headed by one of the Board members and includes 2 additional club members who will rotate on some regular schedule, to be determined.

#### Homer Garden Club General Giving Guidelines 2023

The Mission of the Homer Garden Club (HGC) is to educate and exchange reliable information about gardening and related activities.

#### Who Are We?

 $\overline{\text{HGC}}$  is a non-profit organization which was formed in 1984 as a group of Homer gardeners to share gardening information and experiences. The club has expanded over the years and now holds a 501(C)(3) status. It is led by a board elected by the general membership.

#### **Giving Program**

HGC does not provide a formal grant program. The Club's intent is to consider requests for funds, when support is needed, to assist and aid in gardening-related scientific and educational projects.

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#### Who is eligible?

Non-profit organizations whose goal is education, Educational entities,

For-profit entities providing free educational seminars to the community related to gardening. Assistance from HGC would be only for venue and/or educational materials for the event.

Individuals who are members of the Homer Garden Club and wish to further their knowledge of horticulture and share with the community through the Master Gardener certification program.

Individuals who are residents of the southern Kenai Peninsula (Ninilchik and south) can apply for the HGC scholarship.

#### **Application Process**

For School Programs and Community Assistance Programs: Applicant will inform the HGC General Giving Committee of the intent and focus of their request, including project description, gardening and educational value and start and completion dates. The request should include individuals or staff involved in implementation of the project and a list of community partners, if any and indicate how HGC and any additional funds or in-kind donations would be used for successful completion of the project.

#### For Scholarships:

Applicants to the **Master Gardener Program** must be members in good standing of HGC and agree to complete all course work and community service work that is required. Upon successful completion of course work and community service, the Master Gardener tuition will be reimbursed.

Applicants interested in horticultural sciences, landscaping, garden design, greenhouse management, farming, or a related environmental field and wish to apply for a scholarship shall apply via the Scholarship application process.

#### Homer Garden Club Review and Action

The HGC General Giving Committee will consider submitted requests to determine if the request is appropriate. Requests that are approved by the General Giving Committee will be presented to the HGC Board of Directors for final approval. The Board reserves the option to ask for additional or clarifying information before making its decision. Should a request not earn Board approval, for whatever reason, the proposal is denied, and the Board's decision is final. However, if a request is approved by the Board, the essence of the proposal will be published in the next HGC newsletter.



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
